Gills – flaps that fish breathe through

Symbiosis – 2 animals which live together and both benefit from the other.

Pollution – something put into the sea which harms the things that live there.

Mammals - give birth to live young, warm blooded, breathe air

Fish - lay eggs, have scales, breathe through gills.

Invertibrates - don't have a backbone.

<u>History</u>

Events beyond living memory – Grace Darling and the formation of the RNLI.

Facts –

- Grace Darling was born in 1815 in Northumberland
- In 1838, aged 22, she and her father risked their lives to rescue 9 people from a ship which had crashed onto rocks.
- She became famous and recognised as a heroine, and this rescue led to the formation of the RNLI
